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A Warm Welcome for the Third Head of School



On January 7, 2021, the Board of Trustees announced the appointment of Mrs. Nancy Schuler as the third head of Westminster School. The decision marked a key moment of transition for the institution, from thirty years of growth under Mr. Glover's leadership to the new horizons to which Mrs. Schuler will direct the school, always buoyed by the strength of Westminster traditions.

All the members of the Board of Trustees have a personal relationship with Westminster School and profoundly appreciated the gravity of the task before them, selecting a new head – only the third since the school's founding. After months of consideration, including consultation with Dr. Dennis Campbell (School Leadership Consultant; former Head of Woodberry Forest and past Chair of VAIS accreditation team) as well as in-depth candidate interviews, the Board unanimously and enthusiastically appointed Mrs. Schuler to the position.

Mrs. Schuler's roots at Westminster run deep, even beyond her thirty years of professional service to the school. She arrived at Westminster as a sixth grader, just transferred from public school, and initially, not too thrilled about the change. However, under the guidance and love of Mrs. Goll, she adjusted and came to love the school. She was later hired by Mrs. Goll, who considered her "a born teacher." After completing a BS in Elementary Education with a concentration in Business Administration, Mrs. Schuler taught history/ classical studies at Westminster for several years, also taking on leadership of the third- and fourth-grade teaching team. She proved to be an inspirational instructor, with students who not only loved her classes, but displayed a high degree of knowledge, effort, and enthusiasm for the education they received from her. Because of their strong commitment to and faith in the Westminster program, Mrs. Schuler and her husband, Dave Schuler, worked hard to put their three children through the school's challenging program and are proud to claim them as Westminster graduates.

After a hiatus taken to care for twin infants, Mrs. Schuler returned to the school as its admissions director in 1997, making her a familiar and welcoming figure to every Westminster family since that time. Over the years, her list of titles has expanded to include testing director, director of high-school placement, master scheduler, substitute teacher coordinator, summer program director, history and geography department chair, and most recently, COVID-response leader.

Mrs. Schuler has proven her professional excellence, passion for the school, and innovative skills as a teacher and administrator. She sought to improve Westminster's profile in the greater community, initiating projects such as the *Westminster Weekly* online newsletter and selecting and coordinating with an outside digital marketing firm. In her interactions with the students, she knows just how to balance loving delight in them with clear insight into what they need academically and in terms of personal development. She has the force of personality to succeed in guiding them toward improvement and greater well-being.

As evidence of her constant desire to grow as an educator and leader, Mrs. Schuler recently completed a Master's degree in Independent School Leadership. She has served as a guide to many colleagues and parents over the years, providing advice founded in experience and common sense and tempered by her loving heart. The expanse of Mrs. Schuler's spirit is evident in the tears that flow in response to another's suffering and the contagious laughter that rings out at school celebrations. Her lively sense of humor is combined with her steadfast moral character.

With a clear vision for the future of Westminster and a sincere appreciation for the school's historic mission, Mrs. Schuler is the ideal person to lead Westminster into the next chapter of its story. She will carry on the high ideals of Jane Goll and Ellis Glover, and she will introduce new opportunities and implement creative projects, leading Westminster School into a bright future.

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For the past several years, Westminster School has adopted a guiding theme for each academic year. Past themes have included:

The Golden Mean • Words • The Five Senses • Breakthroughs

For the 2020-2021 school year under Mr. Glover's leadership, we embraced the theme "Animals," and the Westminster community fell in love with the creatures that populate this planet. In the context of this theme, the students and faculty got to know some more obscure creatures and discovered new details about seemingly familiar ones. Students and teachers developed an awareness of some of the dangers animals face in this human-dominated world and became more familiar with the interdependence and similarities between animals and human beings, including how people have relied upon animals in the evolution of our societies.

This theme became a celebration that was just as compelling in May as it had been in the previous September. The year opened with uncertainty about COVID mitigation, and the animals theme had a settling effect, giving the students something fun on which to focus. The upper school spent an entire day during the first week of school learning about animals in every subject area. As the year progressed, the students were introduced to a new "Animal of the Week" each week, a list based on selections submitted by the grade-level teams. Each week, the students looked forward to hearing from their teachers which critter would be recognized. During homeroom, advisory, lunch periods, and through the Westminster Weekly newsletter report, the children read fun facts or watched video clips to get to know that week's featured creature. Whether it was the axolotyl or the archerfish, the octopus or the ostrich, the community learned something fascinating and inspiring and came to appreciate and respect each animal.

Throughout the year, the students were treated to fieldtrip experiences that brought the theme to life. For students in the younger grades, the Westminster P.E. field became a petting zoo in the autumn when Squeals on Wheels rolled in with visitors such as a hedgehog, ducks, a tortoise, and a chinchilla. Springtime took the seventh and eighth graders on a science field trip to Catoctin Wildlife Preserve in Maryland, where they viewed and interacted with a wide variety of animals.

Because there was a U.S. presidential election last fall, the history department created an Animal Election at Westminster

School to illustrate how the elements of democracy function and how the uniquely American electoral college system works. The eighth graders made T.V. ads and campaign posters for the two animal candidates, which were displayed throughout the school, and each individual student voted in his or her homeroom "state." In a tight race, the giraffe was victorious over the peregrine falcon and became the Animal of the Week for U.S. election week in November.

April 29, 2021 was Animals Day at Westminster School. Students and teachers arrived on campus dressed up as their favorite animal, and the school became a gorgeous menagerie of creatures with over fifty species represented. The children enjoyed lessons and assignments related to animals in the varying subject areas, while the upper-school students engaged in trivia games testing their knowledge of the animals they had learned about throughout the year. The day of festivities was capped off with a school-wide virtual film presentation about amazing animal relationships, one of a selection of nature movies that were shown throughout the year to emphasize the theme of developing greater understanding for these creatures with whom we share this beautiful planet. This day was a successful and delightful culmination of the compelling annual theme.





March 2020 to June 2021 Taking Lemons & Making Lemonade

When the governor mandated that all schools shut down on March 13, 2020, the Westminster community had no idea how resourceful it could be. One of the blessings of this pandemic has been to open our eyes to our own flexibility and capacity to innovate.

In Spring 2020, within one week of the shutdown, the entire Westminster program was transformed into an online school. Using Zoom as a way to connect, the teachers and students had regular class meetings, and Google Classroom was utilized to deliver materials, assignments, and assessments. Procedures and expectations were modified to mesh with this distance-learning environment, but the faculty and staff provided Westminster families with consistent delivery of instruction and were able to complete the curriculum for the school year. Parents were thrilled by the stability provided to their children and the continued preparation that they had for the next grade. The students were still accountable, devoted to their studies, and were grateful for the anchor that their Westminster education gave them during such an uncertain time.

In the fall of 2020, Mr. Glover was committed to reopening Westminster School for in-person instruction and, under the leadership of Mrs. Schuler, with countless hours of research and planning, that goal was fulfilled. Recognizing that some families would want or need virtual instruction at various points during the academic year, the school prepared for hybrid learning. In-person schooling was made safe by:

- new health checks, procedures, and regulations;
- set up and use of physical space according to separated, grade-level groupings and maintaining distancing between students; and
- regular sanitizing practices in terms of cleaning the

building and requiring personal hygiene habits. Distance learning was implemented by arranging for entirely new technological capacities within the building (see "New Additions"). A hybrid system, addressing both virtual students and in-person students, required all the schedules across the grades to be overhauled, certain revised standards and expectations to be established for teachers and students, and new procedures to be learned and implemented by everyone.

None of this would have been successful without the guidance and reassurance of a trusted administration, the integrity and commitment of the parents, the diligence and cooperation of the children, the devotion of a tireless faculty and staff, and the heroism of a committed maintenance staff. When school opened in September, seventy-three percent of students attended in-person while twenty-seven percent were virtual. By the year's end, ninetynine percent were coming to school each day. School was open and in session every day of the entire school year, with only two instances of a single grade level being quarantined for a short time. There was not one case of transmission of COVID-19 at Westminster School.

This experience has revealed the equilibrium that Westminster strikes. It is an academic institution rooted in the classics and a culture buoyed by beloved traditions. At the same time, it is a place defined by versatility, openmindedness, and ingenuity. The administration, staff, students, and parents embrace this balanced combination of qualities, and thus the school flourishes in times of challenge. The proof shines through in this lemons-tolemonade tale.

New Additions



High-Tech Threshold Security

Summer 2020 saw the installation of electronic doors to several entrances of Westminster School. While we will continue to cherish our welcoming atmosphere here, these doors allow for additional peace of mind with secure keycard entry for all staff members. Guests may request entry by

pushing a call button next to the foyer entrance under the tower, which in turn displays the video and audio of the visitor on a screen in the main office. Sparkling, all-glass electronic doors are in place at the carpool and playground exits. This allows light to pour into the middle and lower school hallways in addition to enhancing safety for our Westminster community.



In August 2020, Westminster met its new best friend – Blackbaud! This exciting platform integrates all digital functions for the school community. The new system eliminates the need to click back and forth between Chalkable, Google Calendars or Classroom, or Blackboard Engage/Edline. In the new Blackbaud realm, Westminster families are able to:

- View and attend to teacher postings such as:
 - Virtual "bulletin boards" with a class syllabus, news, announcements, or links
 - Assignments and reminders
 - Assessment calendars
 - Current grades for quizzes, tests, homework, and class participation, as well as quarterly and yearly averages
- Exchange messages with the teachers
- Keep updated on athletic or club information and schedules
- Complete and submit forms to the main office
- Maintain personal settings for school announcements, news, or postings to be sent directly via email or text message

This new system will streamline record keeping and all electronic activity in one digital location, which will allow faculty and staff to keep Westminster business moving along with ease. Additionally, if distance learning becomes necessary again at any time during the school year, all functions can be completed through Blackbaud, including posting assignments, taking and grading assessments, posting grades, and more. The adoption of this new system is another way that Westminster is merging its cherished classical roots with the innovations of the 21st century.

A Connected Classroom

We always knew that Westminster teachers were creative, but prior to the pandemic, it probably would have been difficult to envision a Westminster class being live streamed from 3819 Gallows Road into the homes of multiple virtual students while the teacher was simultaneously instructing a group of in-person scholars. Through a focused effort in August and September 2020, the administration equipped all classrooms with the technology necessary to make this a reality. Each Westminster classroom now has a "technology tower" at the front of the room which integrates all functions. The station includes a



dedicated laptop on which the teachers connect with students via Zoom and display Power Point presentations or video clips. This device is connected to two other crucial pieces of hardware. One is a highquality combined camera, microphone, and speaker,

which allows the virtual learners to hear, see, and communicate with the teacher effectively. The other is the top-of-the-line, ceiling-mounted projector, which displays the entire lesson on the white board at the front of the room for all students to see. This is all supported by a new system of high-powered cables and faster, more reliable internet installed throughout the building in Fall 2020. The introduction of this connectivity will allow teachers to further incorporate technology into all subject areas and opens up possibilities for more virtual field trips and presentations even after we move past this pandemic.



While these innovations made it possible for the Westminster faculty to teach both in-person and distance learners this past year, other technological advances will bring the community even closer together in the years to come. A public address system was installed throughout the school as well, linking the main station in the front office with individual speaker/microphone stations in each classroom. This allows the administration to make school-wide proclamations, contact individual classrooms, and even introduce a daily "school news" presentation by the eighth-grade class. Additionally, teachers can contact other classrooms or the office on routine or emergency matters.



A Healthier Environment

Westminster School has always prided itself on the sparkling cleanliness of its facilities; however, this year required that even greater attention be paid to creating the healthiest environment possible at Westminster School. The school installed medicalgrade air purifiers in each classroom, which completely purify the air in the room twice each hour. Additionally, we purchased two electric disinfecting atomizing sprayers, which are capable

of disinfecting a classroom (99.9% of all viruses and pathogens) in ten minutes. Finally, no-touch water bottle filling stations were installed across from the main office and in the lower school hallway. Though these additions were made as part of the COVID-mitigation effort and were part of what kept our school open for in-person instruction all year long, the Westminster community will continue to reap the health benefits from these investments in the years to come.



For nearly half a century, Ellis Glover has been the heart and soul of the Westminster School community. His vision for the school has been the driving force behind everything that happens here. His entire life has centered around lifting up the students who walk under that Westminster tower each day. His work has revolved around building a staff who can lead the children in their charge toward their best possible selves while assisting the parents in lovingly and firmly raising their sons and daughters. His legacy is defined by the minds that have been opened and the souls that have been enriched from being touched by his devotion and passion.

In 1971, Mr. Glover's father, a selfmade man and owner-operator of his own construction firm, won the bid to construct phase one of Westminster School. Little knowing the chapter that was beginning in his life's story, a young, long-haired Ellis Glover took a job on the school construction site. At that stage, Mr. Glover was much more focused on his passion for rock'n'roll and his love for The Beatles than on the pedagogical vision of the school's founder, Jane Goll. He labored on the site, running crew errands, pushing wheelbarrows full of brick and tile, installing lockers and classroom paneling, never realizing that he was helping to lay the foundation for his life's work.

Over the years, as each construction phase was completed, the two families, the Glovers and the Golls, would celebrate the school's progress with an elegant dinner. Mrs. Goll recognized the young Mr. Glover's work ethic, enthusiasm, and upright character, but more importantly, she was able to see something that was not yet formed, the potential that waited within him. She watched him as a doting big brother, gently and patiently interacting with his little sister, Nancy, and Mrs. Goll began to think she saw the heart of a teacher there. Their paths continued to cross, and eventually, Mr. Glover accepted a job substitute teaching at Westminster School.

Not only did he step into that first temporary role of Latin instructor, but Mr. Glover immediately assisted Mrs. Goll with the planning and execution of the many end-of-year events at the school, which led to a permanent job offer as Mrs. Goll's assistant. While she recognized that Mr. Glover possessed characteristics and gifts that could make him an effective leader, Mrs. Goll also acknowledged his weaknesses and was forthright in revealing those to him. She sought to help him overcome his faults, to mentor him so that he could live the most rewarding and impactful life possible. She insisted that he go back to school to complete his undergraduate work and then guided and supported him as he attained a Master's degree from Georgetown University. Mr. Glover admits that before knowing Mrs. Goll, he struggled to focus on academics in high school and his early college years. Mrs. Goll inspired him to see himself as an intellectual being, to find the joy in study, and to believe in his abilities as a thinker and writer.

Shadowing Mrs. Goll every day at Westminster was an education in itself, and she made sure to assign him to widely disparate projects so that he experienced the full range of tasks involved in running the school – from instructing in the classroom, to overseeing the bus fleet, to the inner-workings of maintenance, to interacting with families.

Mr. Glover opened his eyes to all the world had to offer and realized that he was capable of engaging with that world.

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During these early years of his career, after a long day at school, Mr. Glover would cross Gallows Road to Mrs. Goll's home, where she had a delicious, gournet meal waiting for him. Her elegant dining room was a welcoming training ground for him as she introduced him to enlightening conversation, great literature, uplifting plays and operas, the beauty of art, and the illuminating benefit of travel. Through these exchanges each evening, Mr. Glover opened his eyes to all the world had to offer and realized that he was capable of engaging with that world.

Mr. Glover learned his unwavering moral code and unfailing diligence from the father whose ambition and dedication he so admired, a boy who had come from nothing and had built his own business in which "everything mattered." The seeds for Mr. Glover's love of beauty, of great music and drama, were planted by his beloved mother who made sure that swelling tunes of Broadway shows wafted from the turntable in the Glover house. Mrs. Goll was the master who took what was already within Mr. Glover and expanded it and elevated it, challenging and empowering him to see what was extraordinary in himself and the world around him. Because of her he auditioned for and performed in the opera at the Kennedy Center. He read classic works and began to write poetry. She even inspired him, the young man who was terrified of speaking in front of a group when he first arrived at Westminster, to start and oversee a drama program at the school. Over the years, Mr. Glover rose from



being her student to stand beside Mrs. Goll, helping her to govern and improve the school she had founded, her dream fulfilled. When he would thank her for all she had taught him, the time she had invested in him, and the gifts she had revealed to him, she would respond, "I have only given you that which was already yours."

In 1992, Mrs. Goll passed away, and Mr. Glover, the natural choice as her successor, knew that he had a daunting task ahead of him. He had to embrace the dream of his dearest and wisest friend and keep it alive, loyally carrying on Mrs. Goll's mission to deliver classical education to young children. Yet at the same time, he had to make that dream his own. As the new head of school, he could not perfectly replicate Mrs. Goll. As he grieved the devastating loss of her, Mr. Glover had an epiphany. He would do for future Westminster students exactly what Mrs. Goll had done for him – guiding them to grow into their best possible selves. He would lead each child toward the heights of knowledge, wisdom, creativity, and the joy discovered in developing one's full potential. In Mrs. Goll's presence, he had come to understand that the true purpose of education is to draw out of us the very best that we have to offer, and that happens through the powerful conjunction of nurture and challenge. That mission would be the driving force of Mr. Glover's tenure as head of school and his glorious tribute to his late mentor.

Mr. Glover has spent forty-five years striving and encouraging others to strive for these lofty goals. Many times, he has fallen short, grown confused, or made mistakes. He has weathered opposition, criticism, and even attacks, but he has prevailed. Under his leadership, Westminster School has continued to provide a challenging, classical education steeped in the arts and persists in turning out disciplined, courteous, accomplished, and confident graduates prepared to face the challenges and seize the opportunities of life. Because of his stewardship of Mrs. Goll's dream and his own inspirational leadership, Mr. Glover leaves this school strong and ready to continue with its mission for many more years.

A Tale of Two Graduations

pring 2020 was a time of challenges and uncertainties, and the Class of 2020 weathered the storm with grace and fortitude. After a spring semester of distance learning, Westminster School wanted to do right by its students and grant them celebration and closure in a year that had robbed them of so many experiences. In true Westminster fashion, the administration made the very best out of a difficult situation, holding a hybrid graduation. The ceremony was in-person in the gymnasium with all attendees masked, and each graduate was accompanied by his or her parents. The students were seated in front of a beautiful backdrop, six feet apart, of course, and their parents were arranged in their own family pods in the audience. Unfortunately, the faculty could not attend; however, the event was livestreamed to the teachers and other family and

friends at home so that they could share in the customs of Westminster graduation, including listening to the individual student speeches, as well as one that was pre-recorded and delivered virtually by a student who could not attend. In their remarks, Mr. Glover and Ms. Glazier made sure that these students knew how admired and loved they were for their perseverance through adversity. A photo slideshow provoked sweet reminiscences, diplomas were awarded, and the night was capped off with a celebratory dessert. The administration upheld as many rituals as possible to let the Class of 2020 know how special they are.

Fast forward to June 2021, and the circumstances had changed dramatically post-vaccine. With restrictions easing as the spring season arrived, Westminster School was able







to host a more traditional ceremony, a mark of how far we had come within one year. The Class of 2021 was graduated in the Gryphon Theater with the option of bringing six guests, who were arranged according to separated family groupings in the audience. The entire Westminster faculty was in attendance once again, vaccinated and sitting as one cohesive body. Those masks had not disappeared, but students could be unmasked while standing alone delivering their speeches and for a photo opportunity after receiving their diplomas. In their class grouping, they could sit together on the stage to listen to speeches, while watching the cherished memories displayed in the photo slideshow, and for a post-ceremony celebration on the Colonnade. A cake and punch reception followed for the graduates, their guests, teachers, and administration. Not only was the community commending the hard work and positive attitudes of the scholars in the Class of 2021, but we were recognizing our own relief and gratitude for the ability to assemble once again, something we had not been able to do in 16 months. Abbie Lee Golden Gryphon Award, June 2020

Abdu Abbas Inaugural Recipient of the Sope Peters Heart Award, June 2020

June 2020 saw the introduction of a new award at Westminster School - the Heart Award. It was established in honor of Sope Peters, beloved alumnus of the Class of 2007, who passed away while at university in the United Kingdom. more fully how special this place is while they are here because they have experienced the alternative. Abdu was one of those students. A calm, sweet soul, Abdu flourished in the caring, accepting environment of Westminster, a place which values toleration and love as much as he does. Abdu truly proved his character when, after having some struggles in seventh grade, he opted to repeat the grade, embracing the opportunity to solidify his academic skills as well as add to his Westminster family with friends in a new grade. Abdu always has a good-natured smile on his face, and is always the first to volunteer to help run an errand, guide a younger child, or assist the maintenance staff with heavy lifting. The purity of his soul made Abdu the ideal representative of the Sope Peters Heart Award.



Madison Olds The Daughters of the American Revolution Award, June 2020

The Daughters of the American Revolution Youth Citizenship Medal is given to a Westminster eighth grader who epitomizes the qualities of honor, service, courage, leadership, and patriotism. 

If there is a surpassingly outstanding poem among these, its author is also designated the Poet Laureate of Westminster School for that school year.

Westminster School was hopping this past summer with Camp Griffin! Every week of the camp was completely sold out. The majority of the campers were children from other schools, so Camp Griffin

> served as an introduction to our Westminster facilities and practices. Additionally, the camp sessions, under the leadership of the director, Ms. Kari Mock, were almost all run by Westminster teachers assisted by Westminster alumni serving as counselors-in-training, so the campers were being guided in the Westminster way at all levels.

A wide variety of experiences were offered by age group. The youngest campers, "Explorers" from three-year-olds to rising kindergarteners, engaged in camps such as an environmentally friendly "Griffins Go Green" week, a "Pint-Sized Gourmets" series of cooking classes, and an "Ahoy Matey!" nautical experience. The Junior Griffins, from rising first grade through rising fourth grade, had options including "Sports Academy" or "Science Palooza," while their enrichment camp counterparts delved into "Story Slam" writing camp, acting through "Camp at the Improv," and "Space Invaders" with an astronomy theme. Those Junior Griffins, along with rising fifth- through eighth-grade Senior Griffins, took part in "Splish Splash!" camp at the beginning of August, touring Northern Virginia waterparks such as Ocean Dunes, Pirate's Cove, Atlantis, and Volcano Island.

With COVID mitigation still in place and CDC and local health department guidelines adhered to, the campers and staff were still



able to engage in many traditional activities, including a weekly visit to neighboring Broyhill Crest Swimming Pool. Many campers also enjoyed selected field trips to area attractions. For example, the youngest Explorers visited Hidden Pond Nature Center as part of their "Full STEAM Ahead!" science camp, as well as McLean's Clemyjontri Park and the Burke Lake carousel and train for "I Like to Move It, Move It!" field trip week. For "It's a Mystery!" camp, the Junior Griffins ventured to the Spy Museum in Washington, D.C., while the Junior Enrichment "Time Travelers" went to nearby Bowlero to knock down some pins to commemorate 1967. The French camp, "Mais oui, l'école est finie," took the Junior Griffins to La Madeleine for a lesson in authentic cuisine, followed by a French picnic in Mason District Park. For "History 101" camp, the rising first through fourth graders went back to the late Middle Ages with a visit to Medieval Times, had a glimpse of 18th century life in Virginia with a tour of Mount Vernon, and familiarized themselves with U.S. history through a bus tour of D.C. monuments.

When they were in school, the building was pumping with energy as the children performed science experiments, wiggled through hallway mazes, competed in athletic challenges, created beautiful artwork, boogied to music, and screened films in the theater. Camp Griffin was a true wonderland for these children, giving them a summer of fun after an unpredictable school year.

A YEAR AT THE GRIFFIN ACADEMY

As an uncertain 2020-2021 school year opened, the Griffin Academy staff knew one thing for certain. They all felt very strongly that only in-person classes could be offered at the preschool level. It was extremely important to the teachers that the three- and four-year-olds had that social interaction with their peers and teachers. To that end, on the first day of school, thirteen preschoolers entered the front doors with masks on and ready to go! Though they were not able to venture off-campus for field trips or come together as a whole school for plays or in-house programs, the preschool teachers did an amazing job of providing the children with a very normal school year in spite of these challenges.

The youngest Griffins enjoyed starting each day by playing in the gym. The circle time that followed found the children sitting on their carpet squares conversing with each other and with the teacher. In this setting, they learned the sounds letters make and began to absorb sight words, allowing them to begin to read pre-decodable books. They sang songs, played games, listened to stories, and learned to calm their bodies and be good listeners as their teachers taught them new and exciting things.

The children worked enthusiastically to complete their center work, knowing that great adventures awaited them afterwards. They explored dramatic play centers such as a bear's cave, grocery store, construction site, or camp site. The students spent the day in a classroom space that stretched their minds and spirits,



building trains and tall buildings, playing with Gak, putting puzzles together, painting beautiful masterpieces at the art easel, and reading at the book nook.

The preschoolers flourished in the structure, creativity, and fun of the art, library, science, and French classes presented by the innovative Griffin Academy teachers. Throughout the year, the preschoolers had many opportunities to grow as performers and presenters. They watched fellow schoolmates in the grade level plays, through a new virtual delivery, which always made for a fun morning and



helped them prepare for their own future debut on the stage. The preschoolers sang a charming version of "Dashing Through the Snow" at the virtual Cookie Party during the winter holidays. In the spring, the students proved their TGA pride by performing an adorable cheer for the virtual Spirit Week celebration. Westminster's Veteran Staff A Life-Long Commitment to Our Mission

As Mr. Glover's forty-five year career here at Westminster School reached its conclusion, it was worth noting that there are many people who have invested their lives in this special place. With an elevated mission that inspires employees, Westminster has had a stalwart group of dedicated staff members who have spent long careers here. This past summer, a group of former staff members was honored with plaques that recognized a combined two hundred and sixty-six years of service to Westminster School. This hall of fame includes:

- Dennis Miller P.E. Teacher and Athletic Director, 1992 to 2019
- Stephen L. Best Chairman of the Board of Trustees, 1972 to 1995



The current staff also includes many individuals who have dedicated their professional lives to fulfilling the highest of standards during their years here. To recognize the loyalty of these employees, the school awards a gold Griffin pin starred with a diamond to anyone who has worked here for ten years, and then for every additional decade, another diamond is added to the pin. The following people have been honored with such a pin or an additional diamond within the last two school years, and here they reflect upon the impact that Westminster School has had on their lives, both personally and professionally.

Jori Sapper joined the Westminster faculty in September 2010, and over her eleven years of service, has fulfilled the role of second-grade math and science teacher as well as a short period as the second-grade reading and history teacher. She has been the lower school team leader for

the past six years, and at certain stages has also been the After School Care Program supervisor and a counselor in Camp Griffin. In August 2021, Miss Sapper stepped into the position of Admissions Director, where her warm, welcoming demeanor and expertise in the early grades will greatly benefit Westminster School.

Over the years, Miss Sapper has grown in appreciation for "the dedication and commitment of our students and their families to receiving an exceptional education." She recognizes that not only has she been teaching her students, but that she also has learned from being at Westminster, including the concept that "excellence is in the details" and "everything matters," two lessons that she notices "seem to be going out of style"

in society at large. Miss Sapper cherishes the fact that the school's mission is so clear and strong. She points out that, "As a lower-school teacher, so much of what we do is centered around instilling [the school community's] core values of respect, kindness, and discipline in our students at the earliest stages of their education so that they become ingrained and deeply rooted into who they are as people."

Miss Sapper embraces many Westminster traditions, but especially loves the Cookie Party. She sees it as "an extremely special way to celebrate the many winter holidays and traditions of differing faiths beyond just Christmas. As a person of Jewish faith, I have never felt left out or overlooked by this school tradition, which I think is great," she shares.

In just over a decade, Miss Sapper has noticed that her personal and professional life have been nourished by Westminster School. She reflects, "It is not often that you find a place that truly feels like a home away from home. The mission of the school and the people it attracts have always felt like an extension of my family. I have 'grown up' here...

as a teacher, mentor, and leader and am so thankful for the opportunity to learn and grow in a place that is so aligned with and reflective of my values and beliefs about education and the world."





When she joined the Westminster preschool staff in 2010, Amy Bowab could not have predicted the gravity of the journey on which she was embarking. Not only did she witness the establishment and expansion of The Griffin Academy from its founding, but she grew from a young adult into an accomplished and confident teacher.

Eleven years later, Mrs. Bowab is able to reflect on what a rewarding undertaking this has been for her, as she has seen the school from a bounty of perspectives, first as a teaching assistant and ultimately as lead teacher and science teacher in the threes and fours class, as well as in roles supervising early and after care and as a summer camp instructor and coordinator. In September 2021, she rose to the professional challenge of becoming the kindergarten math and science teacher. In all those capacities, she has been grateful to work with the diverse, kind, and welcoming community here, recognizing that the students "have a special connection to life and learning," and the families are "supportive and bursting with love."



Kristine Lee began working at Westminster in 1989 when she started as an office assistant. Her career path led her to the position of third- and fourth-grade math teacher, followed by the team leader position. Currently, Mrs. Lee is Westminster School's phenomenal Preschool Director of The Griffin Academy. She is also the mother of three stellar Westminster graduates and can attest to the school's success The summer of 2018 will always stand out for Mrs. Bowab because it was then that The Griffin Academy relocated from St. Alban's Church to its permanent home on Gallows Road. She acknowledges that change is always difficult and anxiety-provoking, but "when we walked in the door and started unpacking, it felt as if we had been here all along! It was a seamless transition and continues to be." She is constantly impressed by the "amount of love and dedication that goes into everything done at Westminster School. Nothing is done halfway, and everything goes above and beyond normal expectations."

Once she was here on campus, Mrs. Bowab came to value the school's customs even more. She especially enjoys Halloween at Westminster and names the elaborately decorated Spooky Walk that the maintenance staff designs each October as "one of her all-time favorite adventures." She also loves to be surprised by the theme of the eighth grade's costumed and choreographed Halloween performance each year.

Mrs. Bowab realizes that while she has been teaching her own students over the last decade, she has also been in the process of learning and evolving as a person. She prizes the guidance that she has received from her colleagues and administrators, knowing that their years of experience make them the best advisors. She has discovered that "it is okay to ask for help. We all learn from each other daily." Mrs. Bowab feels that she has built a family here. She is godmother to the daughter of her colleague, preschool teacher Mrs. Farrell, and she knows herself to be in the warm embrace of the Westminster faculty, administration, students, and parents. "I know that when I walk in the doors of the school, I am loved, respected, and supported," Mrs. Bowab explains. "It is because of all those things that I have stayed as long as I have and continue to work hard for my colleagues and students."

in "creating a well-rounded student." She notes that a Westminster graduate, "walks across that stage at graduation and, with so much confidence, heads onto the next chapter of his life. They really are ready for anything that comes their way."

In the thirty-one years that Mrs. Lee has worked here, she has transformed from a college student to a consummate professional and leader of the school, and she has cherished that experience, loving the interaction with students and families. While it is difficult for her to pick one Westminster tradition that is her favorite, she cites the special events and experiences of the upper school, which she has seen her three children live through and benefit from, that really stand out to her, including "the sock hops, overnight trips to Sheridan and Williamsburg, the class dinner before graduation and graduation itself." Mrs. Lee recognizes, "These students are likely to never experience a graduation like a Westminster graduation again – not in high school or college. Westminster does an amazing job of celebrating the moment and creating lifelong memories."

On a personal level, Mrs. Lee will never forget when her youngest daughter, Abbie, and a classmate teamed up to perform Queen's classic "Bohemian Rhapsody" for Mr. Glover's famous Headmaster's Talent Show. "They were missing some guitar players," she recalls, "so Mr. Glover hired two to come and play with them. It was fantastic! Watching Abbie jump for joy at the end was priceless!"

Mrs. Lee realizes that Westminster has taught her that "Time really is the greatest gift and to take pride in everything that you do." She revels in the fact that the school is her "home away from home." She reflects, "I enjoy the camaraderie of my colleagues and enjoy the time spent with the children. Honestly, it doesn't feel like I have been at Westminster for three plus decades. I guess time flies when you are having fun!"



Kari Mock's first taste of Westminster School was as a counselor in the Spring Camp in 2011, but she has taken on a plethora of jobs since then. Gaining experience over the years working in the camps, After School Care Program, substitute teaching, and coordinating events, Ms. Mock now serves as the Director of Camps and Auxiliary Programming and works in the preschool. She is the very proud parent of an eighth grader Brian, as well.

Ms. Mock was introduced to Westminster School a decade ago because her friend, who was a teacher here, invited her to attend the eighth-grade play. She watched in amazement as fourteen-year-olds sang their hearts out and dazzled a packed auditorium. Remembering her own timidity and selfconsciousness at that age, Ms. Mock resolved then and there to give the gift of the Westminster experience to her son, then aged two.

Ms. Mock describes the Westminster community as "a mighty family that has a unique and special life-long bond." She loves to support other parents and their children using her experience working with children through all the developmental stages from preschool through the upper school. Through her ten years at the school, she has developed a deep commitment to Westminster's shared message, "Everyone has gifts, and they should love themselves enough to explore and find joy in them. Have faith and believe in yourself. You can do anything, and there will be beauty in it!"

Because she was the event coordinator, Ms. Mock carries special insight into Westminster customs, and one of her favorites is the eighth-grade dinner on the night before graduation. She has hosted this event nine times, assisting Mr. Glover in catering a gourmet meal for the graduating students. "It is a culminating event, attended by the administration and upper-school faculty. The students enjoy each other's company and sing songs from their play. This is the night where their friendships are cemented, and they are able. to be grateful for the gifts Westminster and their families have given them for nine years." Ms. Mock has watched the students walk through the farewell receiving line at the end of this dinner each year, seeing them smile through tears as they embrace their teachers and express their thanks. She explains, "As I watch every year, I marvel at the poise and grace of our graduating class as they are about to take flight."

After ten years, Ms. Mock contemplates the privilege of working at Westminster School, "being able to work with the finest educators that inspire me with their creativity and passion for excellence." She is deeply grateful for "having my co-workers evolve over the years from acquaintances to family."



When Maria Polchert accepted the position of school librarian at Westminster School in the summer of 1990, she had no idea that it would be one of the best and most transformative experiences of her life. After meeting Mrs. Goll and Mr. Glover at the interview, Mrs. Polchert went home and told her family about the school's focus on the arts and theater and the emphasis on the classics, knowing that the program meshed well with her own academic interests. This makes working at the school a joy because parents, students, administration, and teachers are all clear and unified about their objectives and are able to commit to their jobs enthusiastically. Like many teachers, Mrs. Polchert's favorite Westminster tradition is the eighth-grade graduation ceremony. She is deeply moved by the gratitude and love the students express for their families, classmates, and teachers in their farewell speeches. She always strives to help students accept their unique and inherent selves, so it is gratifying to hear them allude to their growth within and appreciation for the Westminster program.



A graduate of the Class of 1979, Nancy Schuler first set foot on Westminster's campus as a sixth grader, and her heart and soul have been part of the school since that day. She has fulfilled so many roles here, beginning in 1991 when she became the third- and fourth-grade history teacher and eventually served as chairperson of the history and geography departments. She was the team leader for a time and was the Admissions Director for the school since 1997, inspiring families to join this community through her deep enthusiasm and love for Westminster. "I've watched shy children come into their own and find their voice," she explains. "I've watched the 'hams' find direction and purpose, hone their talent and soar."

As she takes on this new leadership role as Head of School, Mrs. Schuler seeks to uphold Westminster's profound commitment to the arts. She notes, "As the arts are being deemphasized and defunded in public schools, Westminster is looking to expand them as we recognize that it is through the arts that children learn to be creative, outside-the-box thinkers....[The arts] will bring them joy and allow them an outlet that they will be able to turn to in times of struggle." Mrs. Schuler firmly believes that nurturing that imaginative, innovative spirit in each child feeds his or her humanity.

Mrs. Schuler looks upon her thirty years at Westminster School with awe and gratitude. "Westminster transformed me. It opened doors that I didn't even know were closed. I appreciate the many people who have dedicated so much of their energy and spirit to the school. It is a great honor to serve alongside them."

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ALUMNI NEWS



Samira Abbasi, a distinguished member of the Class of 2018, has built upon the Westminster training she had in public speaking and in the Gryphon Theatre. A stellar competitor in speech and debate at the national level, Samira earned several honors for her presentation this past year, which explored the detriments of using whiteness to measure others' cultural authenticity. She finished as a semifinalist (top fourteen in the country) at the National Speech and Debate Association Nationals, a semifinalist (top twelve in the country) at the National Catholic Forensic League Grand Nationals, and a semifinalist (top twelve in the country) at the Tournament of Champions. Samira also finished in second place as the tournament runner-up at both Yale University and George Mason University. She was a quarterfinalist at both the Harvard University and Glenbrooks tournaments. Her high GPA, ACT score, and competition results led to her recognition as an Academic All-American within the debate league.

Members of the Class of 2016, **Maryam Abbasi and Sara Abbasi** graduated from The Potomac School in 2020. At Potomac, both young women were nationally ranked debaters and three-time qualifiers for the Tournament of Champions. Maryam is in her second year at Barnard College of Columbia University where she is on the executive board of the historically significant Columbia Debate Society and continues to be a competitive debater. Sara is a sophomore at Cornell University and intends to debate for the school's team as well. Both Sara and Maryam have explored the political science realm through internships with Virginia's U.S. senators, Mark Warner and Tim Kaine.

Not only are the three Abbasi sisters shining in the academic realm, but they are also flexing their altruistic muscles. Maryam founded a non-profit organization, GirlsConnect, which aims to provide computers to all-girls schools around the world. With the support of all three sisters behind the project, they managed to raise funds to purchase six new desktop computers for Maryam High School in Kabul, Afghanistan. In Spring 2019, GirlsConnect donated new computers and toiletries to Education for All, which benefits girls from the rural Atlas Mountain region of Morocco. The Abbasi sisters were able to travel to Morocco in March 2019 to distribute the donations. A year later, GirlsConnect partnered with Project Turquoise, which aids Syrian refugees, and distributed several of their excess computers to Afghan refugees in the D.C. area to enable them to participate in distance learning during the pandemic.



Sara Ghanbari, graduate of the Westminster School Class of 2017, was recently honored for her academic excellence as the valedictorian of Bishop O'Connell High School's Class of 2021. Her Griffin family remembers her as an enthusiastic, hard-working member of our community, and those qualities have blossomed over the last four years. She was an avid track and cross-country runner during high school and participated in two mission trips to Peru, which she describes as a "life changing experience." Sara is attending the University of California, Los Angeles, to begin pre-law studies. In her valedictory address to her classmates, she reflected, "This has been a tough year for us. I hope that we will look back and realize that this year has made us stronger in ways that we might not recognize now."

A Loving Tribute to Mrs. Nancy Potts



In Spring 2021, the school community lost a devoted former faculty member, Mrs. Nancy Potts, who served as the physical education teacher at Westminster School from September 1968 until June 1980.

Head of School and Westminster graduate, Nancy Schuler, fondly remembers being Mrs. Potts' student and recalls, "[Mrs. Potts] had a great laugh and was always cheerful. She expected a lot of us and required us to try everything, but she was very loving and so kind to all of us." Ellis Glover was Mrs. Potts' colleague at Westminster prior to his term as headmaster and recalls that she was always dignified and courteous as she worked to assist Mrs. Goll in establishing the

roots of the physical education program during the early years of the school.

A native of West Virginia, Mrs. Potts was inducted into the Hinton High School Sports Hall of Fame in honor of her achievements as a basketball player and cheerleader. She graduated from Madison College (now James Madison University) in 1958 with a degree in Elementary Physical Education. After her marriage to William Potts in 1960, they settled in Holmes Run Acres in Fairfax County until 1980, when they relocated to Pennsylvania for a time. Returning to Virginia to be closer to family in the late 1990s, she served as a bus driver in the Fairfax County Public School System until 2014 when she retired. Mrs. Potts passed away in May 2021.

Mrs. Potts is survived by her two children, Rebecca Potts Campbell and Rick William Potts, along with his wife, Rachel, and her four grandsons. Her family remembers her for her love of baking, playing bridge, bowling, bird watching, gardening, sewing, drawing, and especially swimming. But most importantly and not surprisingly given the time she spent at Westminster nurturing student-athletes, she was a passionate fan at her grandsons' sporting activities where she never missed a game.

Mrs. Potts' love for athletics and her desire to instill that passion for sport in the next generation was an integral part of her life, and she certainly fulfilled that goal during her years at Westminster School. Our community remembers her with gratitude for her service and love for her commitment and generosity.
